NACAC HISTORY

The North American, Central American and Caribbean Athletic Association (NACAC) is the continental confederation governing body of athletics for national governing bodies and multinational federations within North America, Central America, and the Caribbean. NACAC is one of six area associations of World Athletics (WA), previously named the International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF). NACAC was founded on 10 December 1988, in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

The NACAC is composed by 31 Members Federations: Anguilla, Antigua and Barbuda, Aruba, Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, Bermuda, British Virgin Island, Canada, Cayman Islands, Commonwealth of Dominica, Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Grenada, Guatemala, Haiti, Honduras, Jamaica, Mexico, Montserrat, Nicaragua, Puerto Rico, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, Saint Vincent and Grenadines, Trinidad and Tobago, Turks and Caicos Island, United States of America, US Virgin Islands, and four (4) Associate Members: Curacao, Guadeloupe, Martinique and Saint Maarten.

Amadeo Francis (PUR) was elected as the first president of NACAC. He was re-elected in 1999 and 2003. In 2007, Neville "Teddy" McCook (JAM) was elected president and was re-elected in 2011. After McCook died on 11 February 2013, Alain Jean-Pierre (HAI), treasurer of NACAC and president of the Central American and Caribbean Athletic Confederation (CACAC), acted as interim president. On 7 August 2013, Víctor López (PUR), former President of CACAC, was elected president, a position he held until 2019. On 2 July 2019, Mike Sands (BAH) was elected the current serving president.

The highest authority in NACAC is the Biennial Congress, which is held in association with an official NACAC Championships. The NACAC Council, is comprised of the elected officers at the Elective Congress, held every four years, and all World Athletics Council members from the Area.

An important milestone was attained in September 1997, when the NACAC Strategic Planning Session approved the Association's Vision Statement. Throughout its history, NACAC has held numerous such Special Sessions and Congresses, at which many important decisions, necessitated by global and Area developments in the sport and its governance, have required amendments to the Constitution. The current Constitution was approved by the NACAC Congress, held in in Helsinki, Finland, August 2005. Amendments have since been made at Congresses held in San Juan, Puerto Rico, in July 2007, Osaka, Japan, in August 2007, and in Moscow, Russia, in August 2013.

In the absence of a permanent headquarters, the NACAC Secretariat has always been located in the host country of its president. Over the years, therefore, the headquarters have been located Puerto Rico, Jamaica and now, The Bahamas.

NACAC once operated a Regional Development Centre at the University of Puerto Rico in Carlina and a High Performance Training Centres in Jamaica and Cuba. Changes in the policies of World Athletics have led to a cessation of these institutions. Currently, however, NACAC operates a strong Development Programme which is conducted in tandem with the Development Department of World Athletics. Discussions are also ongoing with the University of the West Indies in respect of the development and implementation of the growing education programmes of World Athletics, emanating from the recently approved World Plan.

Over the years of its establishment, NACAC has created and convened the following Events:

- NACAC Senior Championships
- NACAC U18 & U23 Championships
- NACAC Combined Events
- NACAC Age Group (U13 & U15) Championships
- NACAC Cross Country Championships
- NACAC Race Walking Championships
- NACAC Mountain Running Championships

The Carifta Games has been in existence since 1971. The name was derived by the initial membership, following the establishment of the political and economic Caribbean Free Trade Area (CARIFTA). Two years later the regional governments transitioned into the Caribbean Community and Common Market (CARICOM), established by the Treaty of Chaguaramas, to replace CRIFTA effective 1 August 1973.

In 2003, NACAC brought the annual CARIFTA Games, under its ambit and has since retained it, using the same conditions of engagement as the other Championships.

NACAC has also, over the years, come to recognize sub-groupings within its midst. These are CADICA and the OECS Athletics Congress (OAC).

CADICA, is a grouping of member federations of Central America but includes Panama, a founding member, and excludes Mexico.

The OAC was established in 1990 and has responsibility for the development of athletics in the political subregion of the Organisation of Eastern Caribbean States (OECS).

NACAC has often joined forces with CONSUDATLE, the Area Association for South American member federations. The two organisations have collaborated to convene Championships for the Americas, starting with the Biennial Pan American Junior Championships. Over the past several years the collaboration had been extended to competitions which neither, organizing alone, could generate meaningful participation. This includes, Combined Events and Race Walking Championships.

Over the years NACAC has established Commissions, Committees and Working Groups to assist in the facilitation of its stated Vision and Mission. The current institutions exist:



NACAC OPEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Biennial NACAC Open Championships is the Area's marquee event. At a Special Workshop held in San Juan, Puerto Rico, in 2004, the membership approved the introduction of its Biennial Chsmpionships. This was the last of the six Area Associations of World Athletics to do so. The inaugural edition of the NACAC Open Championships was held in San Salvador, El Salvador, in 2007. There were 26 member federations in attendance with a total of 275 athletes. The United States of America dominated the first edition with a total of 43 medals, 28 of them being gold. Mexico (20) and Trinidad and Tobago (11), took second and third places respectively.

The second edition of the Championships was held in San Jose, Costa Rica, in 2015 (31 countries and 369 athletes) while the third edition took place in Toronto, Canada (29 countries and 319 athletes).

Freeport, Grand Bahama, in the Commonwealth of The Bahamas, is the proud host of the 4th edition of the NACAC Open Championships, during the period, 19 – 21 August 2022.



MRS. ANITA DOHERTY

Mrs. Anita Doherty was born January 25th, 1949, in New Providence but relocated to West End Grand Bahama at the age of (5) five. She received her primary education at West End All Age School and received her secondary education at Hampton's Girls' School in Jamaica, from 1960 until 1967, she then entered Ulster College of Physical Education in Northern Ireland.

Anita Doherty's love for sports was ignited at Hampton Girls' School and eventually she represented Jamaica in Hockey. Her multitalented capabilities and diverse talents resulted in her securing the Jamaican under 16 and under 18 Girls Tennis Championship Titles. She also represented Ulster College (Ireland) in both the Under 21 Netball Tournament, and Track and Field. During the Commonwealth Games in Edinborough, Scotland in 1970, Anita Doherty represented the Bahamas in the Pentathlon scoring an impressive 3,801 points ranking her 14th overall.

Anita played Netball locally during the mid to late 70's. However, she was a member of The Bahamas national Netball team that attended the 3rd World Netball Tournament which was held in Kingston Jamaica December 1970 – January 1971. Anita although living in Freeport would journey to Nassau on weekends to train with the team in preparation for that tournament. Amazingly she started the tournament playing as a defensive player, but was later switched to offense, as she was more beneficial to the team as a shooter.

Anita was the first Bahamian president of the Bahamas Netball Association around the mid 1970's and it was during her tenor as president that The Bahamas hosted a very successful Caribbean Netball Tournament which was held in New Providence in August of 1977. In 1979, Anita was a member of The Bahamas team that attended the 5th World Netball tournament, which was held in Port of Spain, Trinidad. During her time teaching in New Providence, she was instrumental in getting Netball in the local schools, both Government and Private.

Anita was a very good hockey player and a fierce competitor. During her time teaching in New Providence, which was around the mid to late 70's, Anita played hockey winning numerous local tournaments and awards. Similar accolades are part of her Tennis story, playing both singles and mixed doubles and winning several tournaments from the mid 70's to early 80's. Similarly she had a love and passion for softball and made it her mission to master each skill, this led to her playing on several championship sides year after year.

The passion for sports and her unwavering commitment for decades was recognized when Anita was inducted into the Grand Bahama Sports Hall of Fame in 2005 and The Bahamas Hall of Fame in 2011. Mrs. Doherty has been involved in community activities as Director - YMCA Keep Fit, President - Bahamas Netball Association, Secretary - Grand Bahama Softball Association, Treasurer - Inter Scholastic Sports. She was also part of the organizing committee of the 1977 Carifta Games, was President of Grand Bahama Tennis & Squash Club, President of the Grand Bahama Athletic Association, and Vice President of the Bahamas Association of Athletic Associations.

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
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
